Smoke Alarms: Make them work for you!



Fire prevention week 2024 focuses on Smoke Detectors, and making them work for you! If they are properly installed with a working battery or power source, they are always working for you, and they make a difference! Smoke from food left on the stove will activate the detector, allowing occupants to quickly take care of the problem, or provide time for everyone in the house to safely exit. A candle left burning that lights something on fire will make the detector sound, giving everyone time to react. That is what detectors to, they provide early warning of a potentially bigger problem!

Take the time today to check your detectors. If they are over 10 years old, replace them. If the old detectors are battery operated, replace them with a 10 year battery detector. Over time, it will save you money by not having to replace the batteries, and it will save you time by not having to change the battery.

If you have working smoke detectors already, make sure you take care of them. Clean them with a vacuum cleaner periodically. Dust can accumulate in a detector and cause it to go into alarm condition. With the way detectors work, they do not know the difference between smoke, dust, or even aerosol sprays. All they know is that they detect something, and they make sure to let you know about it.

In a partnership with the Illinois Fire Safety Alliance and the Illinois State Fire Marshal's Office, the Signal Hill Fire Department is able to provide 10 year battery smoke detectors at no charge to homeowners in the Signal Hill Fire Protection District to replace old or malfunctioning battery operated detectors. There are many tools that we use in our daily lives and one of the most important tools is fire. You may have never thought of it as a tool, but that is exactly what it is. We use fire as a tool to cook our food, heat our houses, and at times produce light for us to see. Manufacturing companies use fire to shape and mold various product that we buy. Essentially, whether we think of it or not, fire is actually a part of our everyday lives. Why is this important? Well, when used properly, fire is safe. When something goes wrong in the use of fire, bad things happen. One of the jobs of your fire department is to try and prevent bad things from happening, but to do that, we need your help!

This years Fire Prevention Week message again focuses on smoke detectors. You may ask, why focus on smoke detector so often. The answer to that question is easy - *smoke detectors save life and property*! One fire the Signal Hill Fire Department responded to in January of this year started as food burning on the stove after being left unattended. The smoke detector was able to alert the occupant who was able to exit the house and call 911 with minor breathing issues from the smoke. Firefighters were quickly notified and responded and were able to keep the fire contained to the area in and around the stove. While there was smoke damage throughout the house, after work to clean the house and redo the kitchen, the family was able to resume living in the house within a few months. Without notification from the smoke detector, serious injury or worse could have happened to the occupant, and the house could have received even greater damage requiring a longer refinish time or even a complete rebuild.

Fire doesn't care! It doesn't care who you are, where you live, how much money you have, your race, religion, or anything else about you in any way. It will damage or take your possessions and not think twice about it. It will cause smoke inhalation, burn you, or even worse, and not think twice about it. You on the other hand have the ability to think twice about it. Think about what you can do to keep your house safe, and prevent fires from occurring outside of where they should be. Make sure you have property installed and working smoke detectors and that they are tested and maintained. Make sure everyone living in your house knows what to do to safely get out of a house in the event of a fire and where to go once outside. Trust me when I tell you that a little bit of work now to prevent a fire is much easier than what you will have to deal with should you have a fire!



You could have as little as two minutes to get out safely once the smoke alarm sounds. Working smoke alarms give you early warning so you can get outside quickly.

Installation

- Install smoke alarms in every bedroom, outside each separate sleeping area (like a hallway), and on each level (including the basement) of the home.
- When installing, follow the instructions that come with the smoke alarm.
- For the best protection, interconnect all smoke alarms. When one sounds, they all sound. It is important to have interconnected smoke alarms if you sleep with the bedroom doors closed.
- A smoke alarm should be on the ceiling or high on a wall.

How to Choose an Alarm

It is important to purchase a smoke alarm that is listed by a qualified testing laboratory. The two most common types of smoke alarms are ionization and photoelectric alarms.

- For the best protection, or where extra time is needed to wake up or help others, both types of alarms or dual sensor ionizationphotoelectric alarms are recommended.
- An ionization smoke alarm is more responsive to flaming fires and a photoelectric smoke alarm is more responsive to smoldering fires.
- Photoelectric smoke alarms are the best type of alarms to be installed near the kitchen and bathrooms to reduce nuisance alarms.

Testing and Maintenance

- Test smoke alarms at least once a month by pushing the test button.
- Follow the manufacturer's instructions for cleaning to keep smoke alarms working.

Replacement

- Smoke alarms with nonreplaceable (long-life) batteries are designed to remain effective for up to 10 years. If the alarm chirps, warning that the battery is low, replace the entire smoke alarm right away.
- For smoke alarms that do not have non-replaceable (long-life) batteries, replace batteries at least once a year. If the alarm chirps, replace only the battery.
